## New Economy Initiative Announces \$1.2 Million in Grants to Support Inclusive Small Business Growth

DETROIT – Today, the New Economy Initiative (NEI) announced nearly \$1.2 million in grants to provide small businesses inclusive access to capital, practical assistance, information, and connections to business resources in southeast Michigan.

"Small businesses remain the best catalyst to drive economic growth and build resilience, but inclusion is the multiplier we need for this region to realize its full potential," said Wafa Dinaro, executive director of NEI. "Through trusted community-focused nonprofits, these grants will help underserved small business owners and entrepreneurs access the capital and resources they need to expand and create opportunities in their community."

The funds are part of NEI's <u>Inclusive Small Business Support Network Fund launched in May</u> <u>2021</u> to drive small business growth in Detroit, Hamtramck, Highland Park and other Wayne County communities. Ten nonprofit business support organizations will receive the total of \$1.195 million in grants, which individually range from between \$75,000 and \$150,000. Grantees include:

"At the height of the pandemic, small businesses in communities where NEI invested in building a strong network fared far better than those that did not. One of the lessons of the past two years is that we need to build stronger networks throughout the region that can deliver timely and comprehensive support to underserved small businesses," said Dinaro, who led Wayne County's efforts to distribute \$80 million in pandemic-related grants and loans to small businesses prior to becoming NEI executive director in February 2022.

With the latest announcement, NEI has awarded \$3.3 million from the Inclusive Small Business Support Network Fund to date. The fund was launched with \$19.5 million of support from

funders, including the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan, Ford Foundation, Hudson-Webber Foundation, The Kresge Foundation, Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation, William Davidson Foundation, and W.K. Kellogg Foundation.

The fund, which includes a partnership with Invest Detroit to support this critical network, builds on the NEI's focus on existing and new small businesses under 50 employees that are navigating the challenges of COVID's impact and looking ahead for growth opportunities.
